

can offer pile turners on any scale from the smallest press (B2) up to almost the largest (1850 x 1400 mm).

In June we saw our 100th Pile Turner installed since a direct sales channel began in the UK in 2000.

Waste conveyor sales are up, particularly to Muller Martini and Heidelberg customers to work alongside saddle stitchers. Sales have also increased of bespoke conveyors.

Finally, we continue to take a keen interest in addressing environmental issues as do our customers – as you will see from their testimonials.

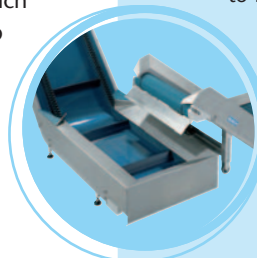

Stories from the Press Room > Keeping blankets clean

More and more of Busch pile turner users are reporting that airing the stack before the first pass keeps the blankets cleaner for longer.

Airing before printing removes much of the paper dust, which builds up on the first unit blanket. After the first pass, before backing up, airing removes surplus spray powder.

Customers tell us that with a Busch Pile Turner the typical run length between blanket cleans has extended from 20,000 to 30,000 impressions if the stack is aired and jogged before printing. Whilst time may not always allow for this – down-time on the press for blanket cleaning probably takes longer than the five minutes taken on the pile turner before printing!



Flexibility is key > Waste conveyors

The beauty of the waste conveyor is its flexibility in meeting all kinds of applications, such as saddle stitchers.

Companies looking to purchase a modern saddle stitcher running at very high speeds manned by a single operator would have to look seriously at a waste conveyor designed to facilitate modern automation.

Without a waste conveyor system, the stitcher would have to be stopped for safety reasons to clean out waste, which can often cause minor problems of feeding when the stitcher is re-started. The obvious result is a slow down in overall productivity.

B2 Pile Turner > Calverts

“As a cooperative we make joint decisions,” explains Paul Kither. “We have a weekly meeting as well as a monthly financial meeting here at Calverts where proposals are put forward and decisions made. Dave Bedwell chose the Busch Pile Turner in March at Ipx and I have to say we are all delighted.

It has made such a difference in the press room. We work a continental shift system. I work with Andy Wooldridge. Dave Bedwell and Lee Howlett work the other shift. The Busch Pile Turner has speeded up the process and made all our lives easier and safer. We have a 5-col Heidelberg 74 running steadily from 7am until 7pm. We pride ourselves on a tidy and efficient operation. The pile turner helps us to maintain that.”

Calverts is a cooperative graphic design and printing company in Bethnal Green providing both litho and digital print for a diversity of non-profit making organisations such as the Cinema and Television benevolent fund, Minority Rights Group International, Landmine Action and the National Institute for Mental Health. They also work with schools and colleges such as the British School of Osteopathy and the

Fashion Design department at the University of Westminster.

The company promotes environmental compliance and uses recycled papers and vegetable based inks. They are Signatory to the Lord Mayor of London’s Green Procurement Code and members of the Forestry Stewardship Council which allows them to offer their customers papers from a sustainable source. All waste is recycled apart from ink which is regularly collected by J&G Environmental Ltd.

As Arthur Stitt explains “We see our investment in the Busch Pile Turner as part of our basic work ethic of prudence and care. The Pile Turner saves paper waste, saves time and minimises the risk of injury due to manual handling. Now we have it we don’t know what we did without it.”

Waste conveyor is a ‘must have’ > Oxuniprint



“Its all about prevention,” says Myles Olsen, Operations Manager at Oxford University Print. “The Busch waste conveyor was a ‘must have’ when we purchased our Muller Martini Valore stitcher. With 4 x Heidelberg presses running full-time the company is printing hundreds of booklets in a week and the disposal of waste is a high priority.”

“I am not exaggerating when I say that staff here are absolutely delighted with this investment,” says Olsen. “It’s the best piece of kit we have had for a long time. We are producing tons of paper waste in a week. Up until we bought the Busch waste conveyor system we were piling the waste into cardboard containers under our previous stitcher and manually handling the container into a chest high skip. The Busch conveyor sits neat and tidy beside the new Muller stitcher, shifting the waste automatically and saving man hours and risk of injury such as RSI.”

Oxuniprint, a commercial litho printer has Health & Safety at the top of its agenda. They have a dedicated employee, Graham Norton who monitors H&S issues and also works in the Finishing department. The company has a weekly and a monthly

meeting and has recently implemented a programme of working according to defined principles. The factory is laid out in clearly marked areas with a green line down the middle of defined walkways where staff and visitors are not allowed to stray without safety footwear. “We insist on regular risk assessments and area audits as a continuous improvement ethos at Oxuniprint,” concludes Olsen. “The Busch system is part of our strategy to ensure the Health & Safety of our employees.”
